Dear Prime Minister Orbán

I am gravely concerned that Hungary is violating the human rights of refugees by blocking their access to a meaningful asylum procedure on its territory. Amendments of the law criminalizing the 'illegal' entry of refugees and migrants are intended to shift Hungary's responsibility towards those in need of international protection. These amendments must be repealed because they are in direct violation of Hungary's international obligations, including those as a state party to the 1951 Geneva Convention on Refugees.

The measures Hungary has taken are in blatant disregard of the principle of solidarity set out in Article 80 of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union (EU), which requires fair sharing of responsibility among the Member States in implementing their asylum policies.

In view of the above, I urge you – Prime Minister Orbán - to initiate the repeal of the legislative amendments criminalizing 'illegal entry'. Moreover I urge you to exclude Serbia from the list of 'safe countries'.

Thank you for your attention to my request.
